CHSSA Language:

Generative artificial intelligence should not be cited as a source; while something like ChatGPT may be used to guide students to articles, ideas, and sources, the original source of any quoted or paraphrased evidence must be available if requested. Students are prohibited from quoting or paraphrasing text directly from generative AI sources like ChatGPT in events in which speeches must be the original created work of a competitor.

TCFL Language:

In events with limited preparation, including International Extemporaneous Speaking, National Extemporaneous Speaking, and Parliamentary Debate, the use of generative artificial intelligence, including online resources/sites like ChatGPT or tools and/or plugins that work offline, shall be prohibited.

This prohibition shall be enforced through the use of the proctor(s) for these events, who is (are) the individual(s) overseeing the preparation room(s) for limited preparation events. If the proctor becomes aware that a competitor or team is using generative artificial intelligence sites, they shall verify the use has occurred, notify the individual(s) of the violation of this rule, and identify the individual(s) to the TCFL Protest Committee. The individual(s) shall proceed with their round and report to the Tab Room after the round with their coach of record to review the incident with the TCFL Protest Committee.

If a competitor or team is determined to have used generative artificial intelligence sites during their limited preparation time, the consequences shall be as follows:

- I. For a first violation, the competitor shall forfeit the round in which the violation occurred.
- 2. For any violation after the first, the competitor or team shall be disqualified from the tournament.
